# Steve Jobs

Steve Jobs helped \_\_\_\_\_<sup>Verb</sup> the personal computer in the late 70s. In the early 80s, Jobs was among the first to see the commercial potential of the mouse-driven GUI. After losing a power struggle with Apple's board of \_\_\_\_\_<sup>Plural noun</sup> in 1985, Jobs founded NeXT, a \_\_\_\_\_<sup>Adjective</sup> \_\_\_\_\_<sup>Noun</sup> development company specializing in the higher education and business markets.

In 1996, Apple bought NeXT for US\$402 million, bringing Jobs back to the company he founded.
