Earth Overshoot Day arrives earlier

The latest grim news about the Earth's Noun-Plural is that we are using them up faster and faster every
year, and that is creating bigger and bigger economic inequalities between countries.
We hit what is known as Earth Proper Noun Day even earlier this year - on 19 August
Global Footprint Network, the environmental think-tank that monitors mankind's impact on the planet, working
with the World Wide Fund for Nature, said we are Preposition or subordinating conjunction out of irreplaceable
reserves.
Christophe Roturier, Scientific Director with WWF France, told euronews: "From this day we're using more than
the planet can replenish. I'm talking about the earth's natural resources: water, land, forests,
fish stocks, all that is essential for life. But also what the earth can absorb, I am talking about all the things we
throw away, and also the CO2, only a certain amount of which can be absorbed by the forests and by the oceans.
So from this day we are running an ecological deficit, and we are beginning to build up levels of waste that can't
be absorbed by the planet."
He says we need to consume more and waste less for the sake of future generations.
The world is getting the resources of more than one and a half Earths each year.
The United Arab Emirates consumes 12.3 times its resources, Japan seven times, China 2.2 times, and the United
States 1.9 times.
In Europe, Italy is consuming 4.4 times its biocapacity, Switzerland 4.3 times, Britain 3.3, Germany 2.5 and
France
