Public Policy

<u>Proper Noun</u> so-called Multiple Streams approach remains one of the most <u>Verb - Base Form</u> theories of policy formation, if also one of its least systematically applied. At the heart of the perspective lies an interest in explaining agenda change--how and why some issues move onto and up the decision agenda of government, while others do not. Through case studies of federal policy making in the areas of <u>Noun</u> and <u>Adjective</u> panel design consisting of 247 interviews with policy makers over a 4-year period, Kingdon developed an explanation of policy change that accommodated some elements of rationalism and incrementalism, while rejecting as inadequate the traditional <u>Verb - Present ends in ING</u> and incremental models of policy formation.
