# Big-Rig School

So you wanna learn how to drive a/an Num under twenty Wheeler? Well, you've come to the right place, but you're gonna wanna dress for the occasion; First, you'll need to get yourself a cowboy Fashion accessory and a fine pair of Adjective Animal skin boots. Then, you're going to need an oversized belt Type of fastener to contain that big ole Consumable liquid gut of yers. Now follow me and let's go for a Verb Base Form! My first peril of wisdom for you is this, "Always, respect your Adjective -Rigg!

You can accomplish this task best by performing a pre-trip inspection before you Verb Base Form the road. So let's start by Verb Present ends in ING under the Semi truck part as It never hurts to top up those fluids starting with the Semi truck part oil. After you're done with that, let's inspect those tires to ensure they're road ready. (Just a hint), I like to give them a little Verb Base Form, because as the ole saying goes, "if the tires Repeat Last Verb Base Form back, hit the road Jack"! Now there are a few other Adjective checks you can do but I'll let you research those on your own. Now you're ready for the big boy/girl seat, we're going to Verb Base Form the controls. First, take your Part of Body and Verb Base Form in the clutch pedal, then with your Part of Body, take the stick-shifter knob and Adverb Verb Base Form it into first gear. Now, Adverb let out the clutch pedal, but keep in mind, if you let it out too Adverb the engine will stall (a bad habit commonly known as Verb Present ends in ING the clutch).

Adjective note, If you can't get the gear-shifter into place, don't Verb Base Form it or you'll end up Verb Present ends in ING the gears which will eventually burn out your Semi truck part. Alright, now that you know the do's and don'ts, let's get roll'n!
