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Honolulu, Hawaii

The word Honolulu means "protected _____^{Noun}" in the Hawaiian language, and it's thought that there has been a _____^{Noun} in the spot since the 12th century. Despite English _____^{Noun Plural} wanting to call it _____^{Adjective} _____^{Proper Noun} or _____^{Last Name possessive} Harbor (after Captain _____^{First Name} _____^{Last Name}, who landed there in 1778), the Hawaiian name for the city stuck, and it was ultimately declared capital of the Hawaiian kingdom by King _____^{Name} III in 1850, more than a _____^{number} years before Hawaii became a state in 1959.

Boise, Idaho

Boise (pronounced " _____^{cool word}" by locals, not " _____^{cool word}") is a French word that means " _____^{Noun}," which, legend has it, is what 19th-century French Canadian _____^{Noun} trappers exclaimed when they saw the _____^{Adjective} banks of the Boise River: "Les _____^{exclamation}!" It appeared like an oasis after crossing the plains of the _____^{Adjective} part of the state. Some accounts say they called it "la _____^{French word} _____^{French word}," which means "the _____^{Adjective} _____^{Noun}." Even today, Boise is known as the "City of _____^{Proper Noun}." In 1864, a year after Idaho _____^{Noun} was established with _____^{Cool Word} as the capital, that distinction moved to Boise, and Idaho became a state in 1890. Today, Boise's _____^{Adjective} Idaho State _____^{Location} is one of the spookiest _____^{Adjective} places.
