Des Moines, Iowa

This capital city is named after the Des Moines <u>body of water</u>, but no one is really sure how the name of the river originated, or whether the origin is French, Native American or some combination of the two. It's been alternately suggested that French meanings may be "______ of the ______" (des moines), although no <u>Noun Plural</u> lived there, or "<u>Noun</u> in the middle" (de <u>French word</u>), because The first mention of the name from a <u>Noun</u> was by a French <u>Noun</u> trader who wrote that Native Americans told him a tribe called the <u>Cool Word</u> (corrupted in French to "<u>Cool Word</u>") lived up the river. However, in a recent <u>Adjective</u> scholarly paper, one <u>Noun</u> claimed that the a little ______ on the fur trader? We'll never know. Des Moines became the state capital in 1857, and today the city Adverb has one of the Adjective Ends in EST state Noun Plural .

Topeka, Kansas

Some say Topeka is from a Native American word meaning "a <u>Adjective</u> place to <u>verb present tense</u>

modifying a noun _________." Others say it's a made-up word. What's known for certain is the city was

founded on Dec. 5, 1854, but no one could agree on a name at the time. Among the rejected options:

(after famous orator Daniel Webster), Mid-Continent (because of its geographical location) and

First Name Possessive Noun (in reference to the local Last Name family, who had originally

established a crossing over the Kansas <u>Noun</u> at the site). We also know that the name <u>Noun</u>,

whatever its origins, ultimately won out. When Kansas became a state in 1861, Topeka was chosen as capital.

Today, Topeka has one of the country's <u>Adjective Ends in EST</u> Noun parks.
